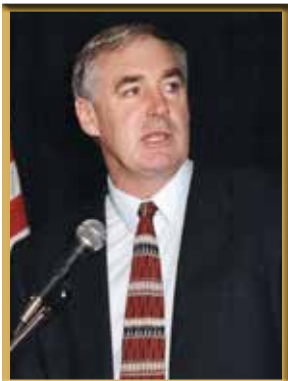

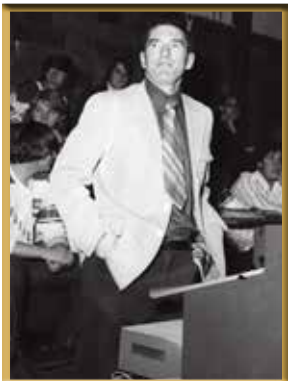

Under his leadership, he is credited with saving middle school athletics in St. Paul in the midst of a budget crunch. He also served as a member of the League's Athletic Directors advisory committees and he has held leadership roles on Region committees and in other athletic associations.

He has served the MnIAAA as a presenter and liaison for MSHSL to MnIAAA in addition to attending many State and National Conferences. Gerry won the State Award of Merit from the NIAAA. Among his many awards already received, Gerry was inducted into the MSHSL Hall of Fame and the Minnesota Basketball Coaches Association Hall of Fame.
